**VIVA-VOCE:** The students have to maintain dairy in which they have to write 5 exercises of pleading and 5 exercises of Conveyancing in his own handwriting.

The viva-voce examination shall be conducted by a committee of three persons. In the Committee, There shall be two Internal Examiners and one External Examiner.

The committee shall award marks on the basis of exercise submitted by the student and performance at the Viva-Voce Examination.
